

# **Energy Law and Economics**

In Switzerland and Germany, governments have decided to pursue the so-called «Energiewende» (energy transition). These policies should enable the transition from a non-sustainable use of fossil energy and nuclear energy to a more sustainable energy supply through renewable energies. From the Law and Economics perspective, a range of questions arises: to what extent is it justifiable to rely on markets and continued technological innovation, especially in relation to the present exploitation of scarce resources? If regulation in a certain legal field is necessary, which policies and methods will most effectively spur sustainable consumption and production of energy? The aim of this conference is to bring together researchers from multiple disciplines such as law, economics, and philosophy to discuss, and perhaps answer, these vital questions.
