Purpose of the course unit (module): programme competences to be developed

The general aim of the course is to analyse international, regional and, where relevant, national legal framework applicable to non-governmental organizations (NGOs), addressing contemporary challenges in their establishment and functioning from a legal point of view. The first part of the course provides comprehensive analysis of general issues concerning legal status of a NGO, including definition of a NGO, process of establishment, applicable rules and guarantees, their accountability, and relations with other actors, e.g. states and inter-governmental organizations. The second part of the course focuses on legal regulation of NGOs in the context of humanitarian action. Finally, through concrete examples the course addresses challenges currently faced by NGOs, in particular, in the Post-Soviet States region.
