















Training includes 4 thematic sessions dedicated to the conflict-related sexual violence (CRSV). During the training international and national experts will fill you in on the following:

what is CRSV, its features, identification of CRSV and its forms;

practical pieces of advice on how to communicate with survivors of the CRSV, how to build a case and conduct the defense of survivors;

how international law regulates and defines the CRSV, and how accountability for CRSV works at international level; regulation of the CRSV under the Ukrainian legislation, the criminal proceedings on CRSV in Ukraine;

international practice regarding CRSV, including the cases of the International criminal court

For more than four months now, Ukraine has been standing against russia a in a full-scale invasion of the latter into the territory of Ukraine. During this period of time, both Ukrainian and international organizations and law enforcement bodies recorded evidence of russia's war crimes, crimes against humanity, and features of the crime of genocide. Among these crimes there is a crime of rape, harassment, sexual exploitation and other types of conflict-related sexual violence committed by russian servicemen.

Aim of the training

– to give Ukrainian human rights defenders, representatives of law enforcement bodies, judges, lawyers an understanding of what CRSV is, how to protect the survivors, outline the practice of prosecuting persons who committed the CRSV in armed conflicts that have taken place in history. Everyone who will take part in this course will receive the necessary base of knowledge and skills to work with CRSV cases and survivors. You will be able to more effectively document and investigate crimes, build a line of defense for victims, and therefore successfully defend survivors' interests and the interests of Ukraine both at the international and national levels to achieve at least justice for those who suffered from russian crimes.

Target audience

- human rights defenders working with the CRSV, including those engaged in working groups on investigating and documenting the CRSV, highlighting the topic in their social activities, cooperation with international organizations and Ukrainian government, who need additional competencies and expertise
- lawyers, representing survivors of the CRSV or engaged in investigation and documentation of the sexual violence
- specialists of law enforcement bodies, including police, prosecutor's office as well as judges, who conduct investigation, prosecution and justice in proceedings on CRSV



Session 1: Characteristics of conflict-related sexual vilence

Speaker: Rosette Muzigo-Morrison

In June 2022: among the 12 finalists shortlisted for the role of Registrar, International Criminal Court. Until recently, worked as a Legal Advisor in the Legal Advisory Section of the Office of the Prosecutor of the International Criminal Court. In this role, Rosette also coordinated the implementation of the sexual and gender-based crimes' policy and the training of high-level NATO officers in investigating, prosecution and mitigating sexual and gender-based crimes during crisis situations. Prior to joining the ICC, Rosette worked for the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda, the Special Court for Sierra Leone and the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights.

Key points to pay attention to while working with survivors of CRSV: peace keeping, UN resolutions and practical experience.

Conflict-related sexual violence (CRSV) – definition and main features; who is targeted, what are the theories behind why it happens, why does it happen with impunity, what has been done to address it.

Communication strategy with survivors of sexual violence – how to conduct interview (in particular lawyer-client interview), avoid 'second trauma', how to build communication with children who are survivors of sexual violence.

The impact of gender perspective on CRSV: what does a gender perspective mean and how does it contribute to understanding the problem and finding solutions, supporting survivors and ending impunity.

Work with survivors who are reluctant to report CRSV. Policies of safety and security, witness protection programs

Session 2: International law and conflict-related sexual violence

Speaker: Susan Lamb

Justice of the Supreme Court of Belize, Criminal Division, with a substantial docket in particular in sexual crimes. She is also an internationally-recognized expert in international criminal and humanitarian law, with significant investigative, prosecutorial, judicial support, advocacy and diplomatic experience before various United Nations international and hybrid criminal tribunals like International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia and the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda. In May 2022, was rostered to the Legal Task Force on Accountability for Crimes Committed in Ukraine.

The differentiation of international, foreign and domestic jurisdictions over sexual violence committed during full-scale war in Ukraine. Cooperation and coordination of different initiatives investigating the CRSV

Prohibition of the sexual violence during armed conflict in international law instruments (Geneva Convention, Rome Statute, etc.).

State responsibility (the ICJ, ECHR) and individual responsibility for CRSV (the ICC, special tribunal's): the possibility for survivors to seek justice and the motivation for survivors to prosecute CRSV as international crimes

Challenges brought up by CRSV investigations and strategies of building the cases for international proceedings (things to be careful for, avoiding second trauma, managing media attention etc.).



Session 4: Conflict-related sexual violence; case building

Emma Pountney

Since 2009 Emma Pountney has worked at four of the international criminal courts, ICTY, ECCC, KSPO (Kosovo Specialist Prosecutor's Office) and STL. Emma drafted SGBV components of judgments at the ICTY and at the ECCC, covering the crimes of rape, sexual assault, sexual harassment and crimes of gender identity, as well as forced marriage. Investigated SGBV crimes working for the investigating judges in Cambodia and the prosecutorial investigations in Kosovo.

Case studies of domestic courts and international tribunals: best practices and case-building in conflict and post-conflict situations

Proceedings related to sexual violence committed during Yugoslav wars, in armed conflicts in African countries and in the Middle East

The ICC cases addressing the sexual violence committed in armed conflict (e.g. Prosecutor vs Ongwen)

Prosecution of CRSV committed during a full-scale Russian-Ukrainian war. Examples of international reparations for survivors of CRSV

Documenting and investigating CRSV (practical approach)
