Defence of Master thesis	100	January	Completed and properly formalized Master thesis must be submitted to its supervisor for evaluation. With the approval of the supervisor, Master thesis may be prepared for public defence in the Commission for the Defence of Master's thesis. Master thesis is assessed by the Commission for the Defence of Master's thesis on the 1-10 grade scale in closed session on the day of the defence: - 10 points (excellent), excellent knowledge and abilities; - 9 points (very good), good knowledge and abilities; - 8 points (good), better than average knowledge and abilities; - 7 points (average), average knowledge and abilities, with minor mistakes; - 6 points (satisfactory), knowledge and abilities are lower than medium, includes some mistakes; - 5 points (weak), knowledge and abilities satisfy minimal requirements; - 4-1 point – unsatisfactory. The Commission takes into consideration: - the Master thesis (the quality of content, compliance with the requirements, delivery), - its presentation during the defence, - responses of the student to the questions of the reviewer and the members of the Commission, - opinions of the reviewer and the supervisor of the thesis. The actual defence will be initiated by the presentation of Master's thesis, followed by open-type questions (both on the subject of the research as well as other subjects covered in the course of studies) and final discussion. The defence of a Master thesis will not exceed 30 minutes, including 15 minutes for the actual presentation of the work. During the defence, the author of the Master thesis briefly presents the research indicating the main problem, he/she also describes the object of research, the findings, the validity of methods and provides conclusions and their reasoning, recommendations (if possible).
